**THAT**, Notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 127, this Assembly resolves to reduce the publication period of the Nairobi City County Betting, Lotteries and Gaming (Amendment) Bill, 2021 (Assembly Bill No.11 of 2021) from fourteen (14) days to seven (7) days.

**10. \*MOTION – HON. PAUL KADOS, MCA*****Subject: Illegal road closures in the Estate***

**THAT**, aware that the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 under Part 2 of the Fourth Schedule provides for roads as a function of the County Governments, whose purview primarily deals with County Roads under the enabling legislation; **NOTING** that the Nairobi Metropolitan Service (NMS) and the County Government, as well as the National Government have provided support which has seen various roads across the County Tarmacked or brought to motorable standards to the great benefit of residents; **DEEPLY** concerned that in some Estates across the City, Residents Associations have instead blocked off access and easements on the newly paved roads, under the pretext of security measures, effectively privatizing public roads and greatly inconveniencing other users; **RECOGNIZING** that some of the Residents Associations are demanding gate passes, or even charging for road use and erecting various barriers preventing some vehicles and pedestrian traffic from accessing the said public roads; **AWARE** that the Assembly in 2014 passed a Resolution requiring that all barriers erected on public roads within residential areas be removed without conditions and the same opened to public use; **REITERATING** that while the County took action to implement this Resolution, seven years have since lapsed and Residents Associations seem to have gone back to business as usual, with every estate currently with public access roads now blocked or barriers erected and passage only possible through gate passes; this Assembly **RESOLVES** that the County Executive in conjunction with the Nairobi Metropolitan Services take immediate action to remove any barriers erected on public roads within the residential estates with a view to restoring such roads to public use and to ensure no such barriers are erected in future on public roads without the County's authority.

# NOTICES

## I. The Assembly resolved on Tuesday, 9<sup>th</sup> February, 2021 as follows: -

- a) **THAT**, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 103(4), this Assembly orders that, each speech in a debate on any **Motion**, including a Special motion be limited in the following manner:-A maximum of three hours with not more than twenty (20) minutes for the Mover and ten (10) minutes for each other Member speaking, except the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party, who shall be limited to a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes each, and that ten (10) minutes before the expiry of the time, the Mover shall be called upon to reply; and that priority in speaking be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Sectoral Committee, in that Order.
- b) **THAT**, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 103(4), this Assembly orders that, each speech in a debate on **Bills** sponsored by a Committee, the Leader of the Majority Party or the Leader of the Minority Party be limited as follows:- A maximum of forty five (45) minutes for the Mover, in moving and fifteen minutes (15) in replying, a maximum of thirty (30) minutes for the Chairperson of the relevant Committee (if the Bill is not sponsored by the relevant Committee), and a maximum of ten (10) minutes for any other Member speaking, except the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party, who shall be limited to a maximum of fifteen Minutes (15) each (if the Bill is not sponsored by either of them); and that priority in speaking be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Sectoral Committee, in that Order.

**\*MOTION – HON. PATRICIAH MUTHEU MUSYIMI, MCA**

***Subject: Measures to equip Informal Settlements with firefighting facilities***

**THAT**, aware that Part 2 of the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution provides for firefighting services and disaster management as a function of the County Governments: **DEEPLY CONCERNED** that there is increasingly numerous cases of fire outbreaks, particularly affecting markets and informal settlements across the county; **NOTING** that these fire outbreaks have caused heavy losses for residents, some of whom have had these incidents affect them repeatedly; **RECOGNIZING** that if the County Executive were to take measures to ensure fire safety precautions are taken in all markets and informal settlements it would help curb the scope of damage caused by the repetitive fires since the response will be timely; **REALIZING** that these measures ought to include mapping out hot spots across informal settlements and markets where the repetitive fire outbreaks are notorious; **CONVINCED** that the County can do this by equipping Nyumba Kumi and select volunteers under it, with the necessary facilities such as fire extinguishers to act as first responders in case of fire or other emergency outbreaks; this Assembly urges the County Executive to urgently take measures to identify, train and equip Nyumba Kumi members and such volunteers under them with the necessary skills and equipment as appropriate to enable them to respond faster to fire and emergencies in Nairobi City County especially the informal settlements where rescue services take longer to respond.
