2.0. INTRODUCTION

- o6. The progress report of the Sectoral Committee on Environment and Natural Resources is anchored on the provisions of Standing Order 192 which requires Sectoral Committees to prepare and submit to the select committee on Liaison progress reports.
- o7. In order to achieve its objectives, the Committee through a consultative approach developed a work plan running from January, 2018 to December 2018. The Committee used various tools under its disposal to achieve its set goals. This included; meeting/engaging with the County Executive Members and other stakeholders, consideration of the sector's budget estimates, and conducting site visits.
- o8. Despite not having achieved all its objectives, the Committee can report to have accomplished a few of its set goals, this include; finalizing over 90% of the pending statements, preparing reports on all site inspection visit and ensuring that the Public Nuisance legislative proposal is geared to publications and later enacted into law.

5.0. CHALLENGES

 - iii.) Non commitment of some Members towards Committee work.
 - iv.) Failure to adhere to the committee work plans due to upcoming business in between the stipulated time.

The Committee notes that the period under review has been marked with a lot of activities aimed at enhancing oversight mandate of the Committee. Most of the activities carried out were oversight in nature and the Committee can report to have been instrumental in addressing issues affecting the residents.
