Subject: A policy for rehabilitation of street families/children & Construction of proposed Rehabilitation Centre in Ruai

THAT, aware that the problem of street children/families is not limited only to the Third World where there are hundreds of thousands of children running away from home and living on the streets across the world, which has become a pandemic problem for many governments in the World; **further aware** that of recent years the problem of street children/families in the Nairobi City has increased thereby affecting business in the city Centre; noting that this problem had turned into a social nightmare with more street children/families invading major streets within the Central Business District (CBD); **concerned** that these street children/families are now extorting money from innocent pedestrians and motorists through intimidation and threats of use of human waste, some of them come up with all sorts of tricks, ranging from having sick children or people suffering from a terrible disease accompany them; **further concerned** that below the veneer of a dirty street person is a well calculated and thriving drug and

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alcohol business where the street people are used as mules to transport drugs and alcohol from one point to another, worse are the peddlers who sell drugs to the street people on credit to permanently keep them hooked and in debt, leading to a vicious cycle of petty thieving to sustain the habit; **acknowledging** the effort by the County government to bring sanity in the Central Business District by launching an operation to flush out street families from the C.B.D, this Assembly urges the County Executive to:-

- i. develop a comprehensive policy with programmes for the rehabilitation of street children/families, to regulate homes catering for street families with institutional system that identifies, assesses and classifies street families and to solve the issue of homeless people in County;
- ii. complete the construction of the Ruai Rehabilitation centre for rehabilitation of street families/children; and
- iii. integrate street children in existing children's homes

I. The Assembly resolved on Wednesday, 13th February, 2019 as follows: -

IT IS NOTIFIED that the Select Committee on Assembly Business, at its last meeting, approved the following ***tentative*** business to appear in the Order Paper for Thursday, 31st October, 2019: -

Subject: Establishment of a policy to regulate private hospital parking

THAT, aware that Article 186 (1) of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, and paragraph 5 of the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution provide for the functions and powers of County Government on County transport including county roads, street lighting, public road transport traffic and parking; further aware that recent years have witnessed a marked increase in the number of private hospitals with well-developed parking slots, where patients and other visitors are charged parking fee on entry to the premises; concerned that there are no regulations for private parking in the County, which has resulted to exorbitant parking fees in some private hospitals in the County causing stressful situations to patients or visitors who visit a suffering family member; acknowledging that private hospitals may impose parking fees to visitors to deter mischievous motorists who visit the facilities for the simple purpose of parking their automobiles and proceeding to other businesses, this Assembly urges the County Executive to develop a policy to regulate parking charges by private hospitals in the County to avert exploitation by owners of premises through high parking fees when patients and the general public visit such premises for services.
