**10. \*MOTION – HON. SILVIA MUSEIYA, MCA***Subject: Policy on diversity and inclusivity of all vulnerable groups.*

**THAT**, aware that Kenya’s legal framework lays a firm foundation for the principles of diversity, gender equity and equality in the country’s politics and government; **NOTING** that these key principles are supported by the Constitution, upheld by legislation regulating elections and political parties, judicial decisions, and complemented by a body of international treaties and conventions; **DEEPLY CONCERNED** that unfortunately, this critical legal standard of diversity and gender equity and equality has not been completely met, not just at the National but even at the County level in terms of representation of diverse groups in critical county governance structures and entities; **OBSERVING** that making diversity a reality in the County requires not only a conducive legal framework but also the collaborative efforts of relevant state and non-state actors; **RECOGNIZING** that a customized policy framework that borrows from existing legal frameworks but provides for effective diversity and inclusion of all groups, whether minorities, gender sensitivity or other vulnerable groups in public service at the devolved level within the City County would best serve this purpose; this Assembly urges the County Executive to explore mechanisms for developing a Diversity and Inclusivity Policy for the County and in the meantime enforce the provisions of the existing National law to promote diversity and inclusion of all vulnerable groups in County governance.

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# **NOTICE PAPER I**

## **Tentative business for Tuesday, 19<sup>th</sup> November, 2019**

*(Published pursuant to Standing Order 39(1))*

IT IS NOTIFIED that the Select Committee on Assembly Business, at its last meeting, approved the following ***tentative*** business to appear in the Order Paper for Tuesday, 19<sup>th</sup> November 2019: -

### **A. \*MOTION – HON. JAMES MWANGI WAMBUI, MCA**

*Subject: Policy for buildings to have rainwater collection and storage systems*

**THAT**, aware that Article 43 (1) (d) of the Constitution, 2010 states that every person has a right to clean and safe water in adequate quantities; further aware that paragraph 11 (b) of the Part Two of the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution stipulates that County Government is to provide County public works and services including water and sanitation services; recognizing the provisions of Paragraph 8 of part two of the Forth Schedule of the Constitution, 2010 which states that county planning and development including housing is a function of the county government; concerned that most parts of the County especially informal settlements lack clean, safe, sufficient and affordable water, which has led to introduction of rationing of water by the Nairobi City Water and Sewerage Company and untreated water supply businesses within the County; acknowledging that the Nairobi City Water and Sewerage Company has continuously rehabilitated various sources of its water to ensure clean and adequate water supply in the County; noting that the increasing population in the County implies increasing demand for basic amenities such as water supply, which the County is unable to meet with the current water supply strategies; further noting that with proper planning, harvesting and storage, rain water can greatly supplement piped water in the County, this Assembly urges the County Executive to develop a policy to compel all owners of buildings in the County to ensure that all buildings are fixed with rainwater collection and storage systems to provide water harvesting and conservation in the County.
