8. *MOTION – HON. PAUL KADOS KIGUATHI, MCA

Subject: Sub-Contracting of youth SACCOs at the Ward Level for Solid Waste Management in the County

AWARE THAT, Article 42 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 provides that every person has a right to a clean and healthy environment; **FURTHER AWARE** that Paragraph 2 (g) of Part 2 of the Fourth schedule of the same constitution provides for refuse removal, refuse dumbs and solid waste disposal as a County function; **ACKNOWLEDGING** that Section 5 of the Nairobi City County Solid Waste Management Act, 2015 provides that every person within the County is entitled to a clean and healthy environment; **FURTHER ACKNOWLEDGING** that Section 16 of the same Act dictates that the County Government may directly or **indirectly** undertake the collection of solid waste from the streets and any other public spaces within the County; **DEEPLY CONCERNED** that despite the aforementioned provision, solid waste collection in the County remains a great challenge, more so at the Ward Level, which has seen organized youth groups resulting to collection of solid

waste in the estates at a fee; **APPRECIATING** that such informal opportunities have deterred many youths from drugs and substance abuse, crime and hopelessness arising from unemployment; **FURTHER APPERCIATING** the need by the County Executive to empower such registered youth outfits through award of contracts for solid waste management service in the County to enable them earn a livelihood; this **ASSEMBLY THEEFORE** resolves that pursuant to provision of Section 38 of the Nairobi City County Solid Waste Management Act, 2015, the County Executive to urgently develop regulations that would enable award of Solid Waste collection service contracts granted to registered Youth SACCOs and Community Based Organizations (CBOs) at the Ward level to enable residents access effective solid waste management services.

I. The Assembly resolved on Wednesday, 26th October, 2022 as follows: -

IT IS NOTIFIED that the Select Committee on Assembly Business, at its last meeting, approved the following <u>tentative</u> business to appear in the Order Paper for Tuesday, 8th November, 2022 at 2.30 p.m.: -

Subject: Early Voluntary retirement for the elderly workforce

AWARE that Section 57 of the County Governments Act, 2012 established the County Public Service Board of each County Government, as a body corporate with perpetual succession and a seal, capable of suing and being sued in its corporate name; FURTHER AWARE that Section 59 (1) (h) of the same Act, requires the County Public Service Board to inter-alia; advise the County Executive on human resource management and development; NOTING that out of the current County Executive Workforce estimated at 14,000, with 60% of it being of the age of 50 to 60 years; **FURTHER NOTING** that according to the County Public Service previous years reports, annually, an average of 651 officers retiring as 2019- 572 retired, 2020- 550 retired, 2021 -535 retired, 2022 - 682 retired and 2023 - 950 expected to retire; FURTHER NOTING that with an annual estimated mortality rate of 41 cases and with a dismissal rate of 20 persons, bringing an estimated total of 712 persons leaving service against an average recruitment of 300 persons hence hindering continuity in service delivery in the County, particularly for the fore-front service providers such as Environment sector workfare; APPRECIATING the efforts and services currently being offered by the existing workforce, notwithstanding their advanced age, health and other hindering conditions against their work expectations; FURTHER APPRECIATING the need to facilitate their timely early retirement benefits and encourage a dignified early retirement; **DEEPLY CONCERNED** that with the aged workforce, with a further 25% of it battling with health issues, alcohol addiction and minor case of officers absconding duties; **DISTURBED** that with such a workforce, service delivery to 'Nairobians' is not at it's optimum; **NOWTHEREFORE**; this Assembly **RESOLVES** that County Public Service Board develops and early voluntary retirement package, sensitize the elderly workforce for early voluntary retirement with a view of employing a younger workforce for effective service delivery in the County.
