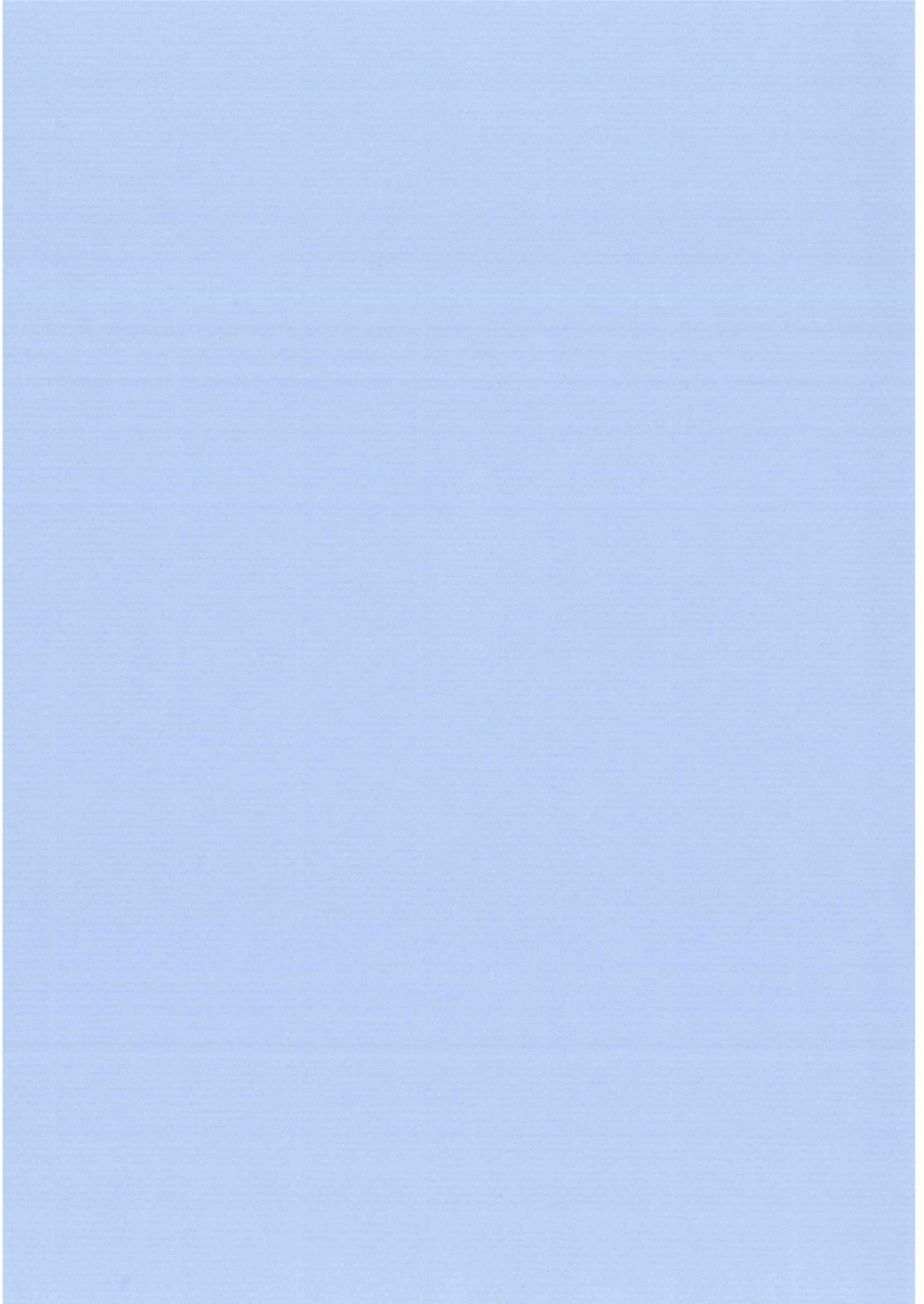

## 1.0. PREFACE

**Mr. Speaker Sir**, the Constitution of Kenya 2010 which establishes the County Governments also grants them powers through Article 209 to impose property rates, entertainment taxes as well as charges for the services they provide. As an oversight instrument on the County Executive, the County Assembly Finance, Budget and Appropriations Committee is mandated to ensure that County's revenue raising measures are consistent with the national finance laws while being tools for regulation, control and budget financing. Consideration of Finance Bills by the County Assembly is an annual activity during which the Committee confirms that the budget passed by the County Assembly has been fully funded but most importantly that budget financing does not limit the County's attractiveness as an investment destination, does not complicate ease of doing business and make Nairobi's forego their basic needs to pay county dues.

The provisions of Standing Order 199 establish the Finance, Budget & Appropriations Committee with a specific mandate which is to:

- a) Investigate, inquire into and report on all matters related to coordination, control and monitoring of the county budget;
- b) Discuss and review the estimates and make recommendations to the County Assembly;
- c) Examine the County Fiscal Strategy Paper presented to the County Assembly;
- d) Examine Bills related to the county budget, including Appropriations Bills; and
- e) Evaluate tax estimates, economic and budgetary policies and programs with direct budget outlay

**Mr. Speaker Sir**, the County Executive Committee Member for Finance and Economic Planning on 25<sup>th</sup> June 2019 delivered the budget speech in which he pronounced new and enhanced revenue raising measures meant to seal leakages in the revenue chain and provide support to the contemporary systems of revenue collection. On the same date he submitted the draft Finance Bill 2019 which was subsequently drafted in proper format and read for the first time in the County Assembly on 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2019, containing the taxation measures announced in the speech. The Bill illustrates the County Government's priorities, which include increasing revenue mobilization and improving service delivery by amending various fees, rates and charges for services, and for other revenue raising measures by the County Government.

**Mr. Speaker Sir**, this is the second time under the Second County Government that the Select Committee has had the opportunity to interrogate and indeed make recommendations on a Bill meant to influence the budget financing plans. In scrutinizing this Bill, the Committee has been keen to ensure that the shortcomings of previous such legislations do not reoccur and affect the County's inflows going forward.



Mr. Speaker Sir, in the course of the deliberations on the Nairobi City County Finance Bill, 2019 the Committee held sittings with the Officers from the County Treasury led by the County Executive Committee Member for Finance were given the opportunity to explain to the Committee the reasoning behind the proposed alterations. The Committee indeed received written submissions from the County Treasury on how best to roll out the revenue raising measures as contained in the budget speech delivered to the County Assembly in June 2019.

Mr. Speaker Sir, the following have shown their dedication, untiring commitment and valuable contributions towards assisting the Committee in finalizing the work of reviewing the Finance Bill. The Committee is, therefore, sincerely grateful to: -

- a) Members of the public who honored their civic duty and took part in the public hearings on the Bill undertaken at Uhuru Gardens Primary School, Kariokor Social Hall, Kayole Social Hall and St. John's Catholic Church Riruta;
- b) Offices of the Clerk and the Speaker for the support extended throughout this process;
- c) The County Treasury who appeared before the Finance Committee for the purposes of making submissions on the Bill;
- d) Stakeholders who submitted written memoranda on the Bill; and
- e) The County Assembly Legal Department and the County Assembly Budget Office who continually provided guidance to the Committee on the Bill.

## 2.0. SCRUTINY OF THE NAIROBI CITY COUNTY FINANCE BILL, 2019

### 2.1. KEY HIGHLIGHTS OF THE BILL

1. **Mr. Speaker Sir**, the Committee reviewed the Finance Bill, 2019 together with the submissions from the County Executive Committee Member for Finance, the various stakeholders and members of the public and came up with the following proposals on the respective sections of the Bill.
2. **Mr. Speaker Sir**, Part II of the Bill titled Nairobi City County Disaster and Emergency Management Act, 2015 seeks to amend the second schedule as follows:
3. The Bill proposes to charge a minimum of Kshs. 4,500 for fire inspection fees that would be charged per visit per household. The Bill also introduces new charges for fire certificates at Kshs. 2,000 per household per year and for professional bodies at Kshs. 6,000 and Kshs. 20,000 for medium and large professional bodies respectively. Small-scale gas sellers would expect a hike of 566% for fire certificates per year, whereas fire certificates charged to petrol stations will experience a decrease from Kshs. 100,000 in all categories to Kshs. 50,000; Kshs. 25,000 and Kshs. 12,000 for small, medium and large petrol stations respectively.
4. It was in the Committee's view that whereas the County Own Source Revenue has been declining for successive years it would not be imperative that small-scale gas sellers experience an increase of more than 500% as it would oppress small-scale business people. These sentiments were supported by the Kenya Association of Manufacturers who observed that it would increase the cost implication of doing business. On their part the Women Small-scale Traders from Korogocho and Kawangware noted the noted that the levies were punitive, in that the charges would have a negative impact to the common *mwana* as the cost would be passed on to the consumers.
5. In regards to the charges for annual fire certificates for households at Kshs. 2,000, the Kenya Alliance of Resident Associations (KARA) recommended that the provision ought to be amended as the County Government cannot guarantee any service that will accrue to the households as a result of paying the charges. Additionally, they submitted that the County Government is currently unable to carry out inspections on existing businesses hence it may therefore be ineffectual in implementing inspections at the

household level. These sentiments were commended by the National Taxpayers Association, who noted that Part II of the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 No.12 obligates the Nairobi City County Government to offer firefighting and disaster management services, hence charging households would be abdicating their Constitutional duty. To address the concerns raised by the public the Committee shall be proposing amendments to the proposed fees and charges for fire certificate to make them responsive to the prevailing realities.

6. **Mr. Speaker Sir,** Part III of the Bill provides amendments to the Nairobi City County Solid Waste Management Act, 2015:
7. The Bill proposes to charge both the license to operate a plant nursery and a tree cutting business license at Kshs. 10,000 per annum. The Nairobi County Citizen Assembly highlighted that the license to operate a plant nursery should be reduced to combat climate change, and tree cutting license to be increased to promote environmental protection. The Committee agrees with the stakeholders that the County must encourage residents to compliment governments efforts aims at combating climate change. In this regard the Committee shall be proposing amendments to increase the charges for tree cutting within the City.
8. Under Schedule 2 (1.3) titled tipping charges, the Bill intends to increase the tipping charges for commercial/institutional from Kshs. 400 to Kshs.600 per ton; domestic waste from Kshs. 200 to Kshs.300 per ton; construction and demolition waste from Kshs. 250 to Kshs. 600 per ton, and intends to introduce new charges for nontoxic industrial waste at Kshs. 1,000 per ton and disposal of expired food stuff at Kshs. 800 per ton. For residential houses, the Bill proposes charges to low/informal settlements at Kshs.100 per house per month; Kshs.300 for medium households (estates) and; Kshs. 600 for high households (upmarket and CBD) per house per month.
9. In their scrutiny of the Finance Bill, 2019, the Committee highlighted that increasing tipping charges for domestic waste from Kshs. 200 to Kshs. 300 per ton may lead to illegal dumping, double taxation for residents and lack of business for the private service providers. Moreover, the Youth Groups engaged in Solid Waste Management at Kayole Social Hall observed that the majority of households in the City pay private



collectors to manage their waste, employing over 500,000 youth all over the county, who would be rendered jobless once the charges are effected. The Committee has taken notice of these concerns and proposed that the charges for CBO solid waste management and transportation be reduced to zero and those for religious bodies also be retained at zero.

10. The Finance Bill contains provisions for optional solid waste management charges to restaurants, guest houses, hotels, primary and secondary schools and universities. The Nairobi County Citizens Assembly, in their memorandum, recommended that the garbage collection fees for schools should be scrapped off as it shall increase their school fees especially in ECDE Centers. They argued that the increase will lead to high levels of children unable to access education.
11. **Mr. Speaker Sir,** Part IV of the Finance Bill, 2019 titled Nairobi City County Revenue Act, 2015 (amended in 2018) is amended as follows;
12. Schedule 9.2 on traders' informal spaces provides charges of Kshs. 200 per week or an alternative of a daily charge of Kshs. 50. The Committee welcomed this provision, as it incorporates affordability of charges to small-scale traders. On the contrary, the Women Domestic Workers and Women Small-Scale Traders from Korogocho proposed that the charges ought to be deleted since there is no value addition to the informal spaces as they operate under inclement weather elements such as rain and sunshine.
13. Schedule 14 titled Food, Agriculture and Forestry proposes to increase slaughter fees and health inspection. According to the Bill, poultry slaughter fees is charged at Kshs. 50 per bird and health inspection fee at Kshs. 25 per bird. The Committee suggested that both these fees should be reduced to Kshs. 10 per bird.
14. Schedule 6.1 titled Transportation Unit Services is proposed to amend the parking fees by increasing seasonal tickets for private vehicles by approximately 35% for 1-month, 3- month, 6- month and 12-month seasonal tickets. The current charges for on- street parking of saloon cars are Kshs. 200 categorized into CBD and other areas outside CBD. The Bill intends to revise these charges and categories to; Zone I at Kshs. 400, Zone II at Kshs. 300, Zone III at Kshs. 200 and Zone IV at Kshs. 100 per day and retains on-street parking fees of lorries at Kshs. 1, 000 and trailers at Kshs. 3,000 per day. The Committee commends the County Government's revenue raising measures but notes



that parking fees adjustments should be modest to minimize corruption at the collection level. In addition, the Kenya Taxi Cab Association observed that the private vehicles are charged a comparatively higher rate compared to other transport sector players like matatus. They further noted that, the proposed parking fee increment would adversely affect their businesses as they are also required to undertake motor vehicle inspection, pay single business permits and advance tax thereby significantly raising operational costs and substantially diminishing the profit margins. The Committee having considered the submissions made has proposed amendments to ensure that fees collected are optimal within tenets of promoting ease of doing business and supporting the County's development agenda.

15. Schedule 2.1 titled Land Rates intends to revise the rates payable for Unimproved Site Value for high-rise buildings to be charged per floor. The land rates are suggested at 1% of the land value. The Committee noted that the rates should be based on Unimproved Site Value for pieces of land and not the actual buildings. The Committee shall hence be proposing that the provision be deleted.
16. Schedule 3.3 titled Amusement/ Recreation Services proposes to charge groups seeking to use open spaces for various activities. The Nairobi County Citizen Assembly, in their memorandum, recommended that the charges should be scrapped off for groups seeking to use the public spaces for issues related to public participation on Nairobi County Government will promote public participation in the County.
17. The Committee has considered the amendments in addition to those that were submitted by the County Treasury, various stakeholders and members of the public and the same are part of the proposed amendments attached to the report. The adjustments to the Bill have been done after taking into account the views of the County Treasury.
