



### Challenges


During the time under review in this report, it is wise to note that the Covid 19 outbreak disrupted the way the Committee conducts its business. The Committee had to move rapidly to holding meetings virtually in line with government regulations on managing the Covid 19 pandemic.

In terms of implementing the oversight mandate and holding meeting sessions, the Committee faced the following challenges; -

- i. The inability to dispense of with business that involves consideration of bulky documents via the virtual platform. This Committee frequently receives volumes of documents responding to either Statements or simply forwarding Plans for approval by the Assembly. The introduction of the zoom meetings has impeded the consideration of documents and plans from the sector within reasonable timelines;
- ii. Some Members barely keeping up with the zoom meetings due to network challenges. This did pose a major challenge in terms of realizing maximum input from Members in terms of decision making;
- iii. Coordinating meetings between the Executive and the newly formed NMS agency remained the greatest challenge due to the raging supremacy battles at the time between

the NMS and the County Executive. The executive oversight which entails reviewing, monitoring, and supervision of operations and activities could not be optimally realized by the Committee during this period; and

iv. Lack of adequate funding to transact the pending business before the Committee. As highlighted above in the Policies and Bills sections, it is notable that the Committee has a number of Bills and Policies that need to be considered and all this need additional resources to the Committee workshop kitty.



D. Select Committee on Public Accounts

#### Committee mandate

The Committee derives its mandate from Standing Order 197 (2) of the Nairobi City County Assembly, which provides that:-

"The Public Accounts Committee shall be responsible for the examination of the accounts showing the appropriations of the sum voted by the County Assembly to meet the public expenditure and of such other accounts laid before the County Assembly as the Committee may think fit". The Committee executes its mandate on the basis of annual and special audit reports prepared by the Kenya National Audit Office (KENAO). Its primary mandate is therefore to oversight the expenditure of public funds by Nairobi City County entities, to ensure value for money and adherence to government financial regulations and procedures.



### Challenges

The Committee reported the following as their challenges: -

- Getting information sought which aims at deterring potential loss of public funds. Some witnesses failed to appear before the Committee despite being issued with summons.
   An example is the CECM for Finance and Economic Planning who was summoned on 6th May 2020 after failing to honor two Committee invitations;
- Government restriction on physical meetings in the wake of the covid 19 pandemic.
   Following the transition from physical to virtual meetings, it was not possible to hold effective meetings via Zoom owing to the nature of the business transacted by the Committee; and
- Members had challenges operating Zoom due to constant internet failure. This greatly
  affected quorum and the quality of discussion during meetings.






# Delays in presentation of regulations to the County Assembly

The County Executive has so far not submitted a single regulation to the County Assembly therefore the Committee has not scrutinized any regulation. Jeremiah Themendu tabled a Motion; 'Development of regulations for County Acts by the County Executive within 90 Days', which highlighted that Article 185(1) of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, provides that; the legislative authority of a County is vested in, and exercised by, its County Assembly, and that with regards to County delegated legislation, the County Executive Committee Member is required by various County Acts to develop Regulations for effective operationalization of certain County Acts and in

line with the Statutory Instrument Act, 2013,. The Committee hopes that the County Executive will present the regulations as requested.

#### Lack of motivation

There is a notion by Members that the Committee is not a busy Committee and that being placed in the Committee is a form of punishment. This notion has led to some members being de-motivated and showing little interest in the Committee. However, this notion is slowly changing thanks to the facilitators who have demystified the Committee.

# 13. The Committee made the following observations with respect to the reports presented by the respective Chairpersons: -

- All Committees were inducted on their mandates and they are well equipped to perform their functions. However, they require refresher trainings especially on critical issues such as the legislative process;
- ii) Statements formed the majority of the business conducted by the Committees especially the Sectoral Committees. However, not all statement requests had been responded to. Most Chairpersons cited delays by the Executive in responding to their requests or failure to provide satisfactory responses;
- iii) Committees had only conducted 6 site visits. And site visits being an important oversight tool, there is need to increase the site visits which further translates to reports;
- iv) Most Committees had not tabled their reports on their retreats they held which may raise audit queries;
- v) The Executive had not implemented most of the resolutions of Committees. In addition, projects passed in the budget had not commenced;
- vi) Productivity of most committees has greatly reduced in terms of participation due to the COVID 19 pandemic;

- vii) Delay of responses from the County Executive;
- viii) Lack of quorum despite most meetings being held online via zoom;
- ix) Inadequate responses from the County Executive and the Nairobi Metropolitan Services;
- x) The County Executive has continuously failed to implement County Assembly resolutions since the inception of the Assembly;
- xi) Failure to adhere to committee work plans due to upcoming business in the between the stipulated time;
- xii) The Office of the County Attorney doesn't have enough officers who are able to draft county regulations therefore delays in submission of regulations to the County Assembly; and
- xiii) Incessant Committee reshuffles.

#### 5.0. RECOMMENDATIONS

# 14. In view of the above observations, the Committee recommends the following to the County Assembly

- All Committees to fast-track finalizing of the pending business and to report on any impediments to their work to the Office of the Speaker and the Liaison Committee for necessary actions to be taken;
- ii. The Implementation Committee to urgently follow-up with the Executive to seek a way forward on Committee/Assembly resolutions that are yet to be implemented;
- iii. Committee Chairpersons to be very strict with members logging into meetings;
- iv. Members to be encouraged to login to meetings and actively participate;
- v. Committee Clerks to continuously remind their respective committees of responses due through statements trackers;
- vi. Chairpersons and their relevant Committee Clerks to enforce Standing Order 179 to Members who fail to attend committee sittings;
- vii. That Chairpersons to prioritize time and consider implementing their work plans;
- viii. The Office of the Clerk through the Legal Office to liaise with the County Attorney's office and come up with a work plan on how best to draft and submit the pending regulations;
- ix. The Office of the Clerk to follow-up on the publication of already enacted laws that are yet to be published thus impending their implementation;

- x. The Liaison Committee to immediately inform the County Attorney on the issue regarding lack of drafters and come up with a way forward; and
- xi. The Liaison Committee Chair and the Clerk to notify the Assembly leadership on the low productivity of Committees due continued changes in Committee membership.

# 15. In view of the above observations, the Committee recommends the following to the County Executive and Nairobi Metropolitan Services

- The Liaison Committee to hold a meeting with all the CECMS and Chief Officers to deliberate and come up with guidelines on how responses required by the County Assembly shall be dispensed off with to avoid the continuous delays;
- ii) The Liaison Committee to immediately inform the County Executive and the Nairobi Metropolitan Services that the County Assembly shall take serious actions to Officers who fails to attend County Assembly meetings when summoned and also those who respond poorly to County Assembly queries;
- iii) The Liaison Committee to immediately hold a meeting with H.E the Governor & NMS to deliberate on how best the County Assembly resolutions shall be implemented;
- iv) The Implementation Committee to immediately hold a meeting with the relevant key sectors from the County Executive and the Nairobi Metropolitan Services to deliberate on the status of the implementation of County resolutions; and
- v) County Assembly to allocate funds for the drafting function under the County Attorney's Office.
