

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1.0 PREFACE

The Committee's mandate pursuant to the provision of Standing Order 209 –Third Schedule is, amongst others, to investigate, inquire into and report on all matters relating to; "Implementation of specific national government policies on natural resources, environmental conservation, including soil and water conservation and forestry and control of air population, noise population, other public nuisances and refuse removal, refuse dumps and solid waste disposal."

The Committee exercises its oversight mandate over the Environment and Natural Resources Sub-Sector in the County Executive.

1.1 Background

The Committee undertook a joint retreat with the Green Nairobi Sector (Environment Sector) to deliberate on implementation reports on the programmes, proposed legislations and work plans for FY 2023–24 of the Sector from Thursday 18th to Sunday 21st April, 2024 in Lake Naivasha Resort, Nakuru County. The participants deliberated on;

- 1. The sector activity work plans and procurement plans for the financial year 2023-2024 drawn up in Quarters;
- 2. The status of implementation of projects and programs in the First and Second Quarters of the Financial Year 2023-2024;
- 3. The sector programmes/projects for Third and Fourth Quarters of the Financial Year 2023-2024 and the modalities put in place to ensure projects are initiated on time;
- 4. The objectives, targets and goals agreed upon in the signed performance contracts and the timelines;
- 5. The challenges the sector is currently facing in discharging its mandate, including the implementation of existing Laws and statutes within the sector; and
- 6. Proposals on the way forward for improving service delivery in the sector.

Similarly, the workshop deliberated on the status of air pollution in Nairobi with officers from the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and Stockholm Environment Institute (SEI).

2.0 OPENING REMARKS BY THE CHAIRPERSON

The Workshop was officially opened by Hon. Silas Matara, Chairperson of the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources. He welcomed and thanked the participants for availing themselves for the workshop and introductions were made. In his remarks, he noted that at the end of the workshop, the Committee would have understood the status of air pollution in the County, effects of climate change and the status of implementation of projects and programs of the Environment Sector

3.0 PRESENTATIONS


3.1 Status of Nairobi's air quality

Mr. Danube Ngongang, M.Sc, an officer from Stockholm Environment Institute, informed the Committee that the institution had installed 40 air quality sensors across Nairobi, which provided real-time data crucial for making informed decisions and policy adjustments. The sensors were not randomly placed but thoughtfully located at sites where they could gather the most relevant data to inform the understanding and actions regarding urban air quality. The sensors are placed on the following areas;

- 1. Residential Areas: Monitoring in these areas aid in ensuring that the health of Nairobians was not compromised by unseen pollutants.
- 2. Industrial Zones: By installing sensors in these regions, the institution directly assesses the impact of industrial emissions on air quality, thus enforcing environmental regulations and encouraging industries to adopt cleaner technologies.
- 3. Roadside Locations: The facilitator informed the participants that traffic emissions were among the primary sources of air pollution in urban areas. Sensors placed alongside busy roads help evaluate the effectiveness of traffic management policies and vehicular pollution controls.
- 4. Dumping Sites: Participants learnt that the sensors were critical for monitoring the release of hazardous pollutants from waste management areas, which could have severe health impacts. This data was essential for developing strategies to manage waste more effectively and reduce its impact on the urban environment.

Dr. Aderiana Mbandi from UNEP highlighted the impact of air pollution in Africa as shown below;


Economic Impact of Air Pollution in Africa





Note: Total air pollution damages include ambient PM25, household PM25, and ozone. GDP = gross domestic product.


She summarized areas where African governments could tackle air pollution as shown below;

3.2 AMENDMENTS TO THE NAIROBI CITY COUNTY CLIMATE CHANGE MANAGEMENT BILL, 2023

On deliberations, the Committee adopted the following amendments to the Nairobi City County Climate Change Management Bill, 2023;

LONG TITLE

THAT the Long Title of the Bill be amended by deleting the numerical "2023" and substituting thereof with "2024".

SHORT TITLE

THAT the **Short Title** of the Bill be amended by deleting the numerical "2023" and substituting thereof with "2024".

THAT, Clause 10(b) be amended by deleting the word "at least" appearing immediate before the word "half".

NEW CLAUSES

THAT the Bill be amended by inserting the following New Clauses immediately after Clause 11 of the as follows;

11A There is established a planning committee to be known as the County Climate Change Planning Committee that shall be appointed by the County Executive Committee Member for the time being responsible for matters of Environment and Climate Change.

11B The committee shall comprise of—

- a) Chief Officer for the time being responsible for matters of Environment and Climate Change who shall be the Chairperson;
- b) Chief Officer for the time being responsible for matters of the County Treasury who shall be the vice chairperson;
- c) County Director Water;
- d) County Director Agriculture;
- e) County Director Energy;
- f) County Director Health;
- g) County Director Environment;
- h) County Director Natural Resources and Forestry;





- i) County Director Climate Change who shall be the Secretary; and
- j) County Director Planning.

11C (1) The County Climate Change Planning Committee shall: -

- a) Identify county wide climate change needs and vulnerabilities;
- b) Undertake internal and external resource mobilization;
- c) Review, prioritize and sequence projects relevant to Climate Change mitigation based on the set criteria;
- d) Receive, consider and recommend funding proposals and projects and forward to the County Climate Change Steering Committee for approval;
- e) Prepare and submit an annual report on climate change response activities in the County;
- f) Formulate and implement County monitoring, evaluation and reporting framework for climate change response;
- g) sensitization and trainings at ward level and;
- h) Perform any other functions assigned to it by the County Steering Committee.
- (2) The County Planning Committee shall be the technical and advisory arm of the County Steering Committee.

11D There is hereby established a secretariat for the county Climate Change Steering and Planning Committees which shall be the Department responsible for County Climate Change.

- **11E** (1) The meetings of the County Climate Change Planning Committee shall be conducted as follows:
 - a) The County Climate Change Planning Committee shall meet at least twice in a quarter in each financial year;
 - b) The County Climate Change Planning Committee may choose to rotate the location of its regular meetings to different wards in the County for purposes of engaging directly with communities and familiarizing itself with their climate change-related challenges;
 - c) The quorum for meetings of the County Climate Change Planning Committee shall be half of the membership; and
 - d) In the absence of the chairperson, the members in attendance shall elect one of them to chair the meeting.
 - (2) The County Climate Change Planning Committee may invite to its meetings any technical staff of the national or County government which it considers will contribute to its deliberations, and the attendance and participation of such



person shall be recorded in the minutes of the County Climate Change Planning Committee.

4.0 CHALLENGES FACED BY THE SECTOR

The Sector pointed out the following challenges as a hindrance to its performance. This includes;-

4.1 Under solid waste;

- i. Inadequate refuse trucks and frequent breakdown of the same;
- ii. Rampant illegal dumping of solid waste;
- iii. Unsatisfactory state of repairs at Dandora dumpsite;
- iv. Delayed payments to contractors leading frequent withdrawal of trucks and heavy machinery;
- v. Prolonged procurement procedures; and,
- vi. On-going court case challenging franchising system of waste management.

4.2 Under recreation and greening services;

- i. Adverse weather conditions hence tree planting programme is affected;
- ii. Tedious and long procurement procedures in tree seedling purchasing; and,
- iii. Negative attitude in environmental conservation among the public.

4.3 Environmental Monitoring Compliance and Enforcement;

- i. Wide spread noise pollution;
- ii. Lack of sufficient transport;
- iii. Inadequate personnel to carry out patrols on a daily basis;
- iv. Inadequate deterrence in our courts;
- v. Interference in the court systems;
- vi. Inadequate public awareness;
- vii. Delayed procurement processes;
- viii. Court cases on public toilets management contracts; and,
- ix. Court cases on Solid Waste Management contracts.



5.0 OBSERVATIONS

Upon examination and deliberation of the reports and its findings, the Committee made the following observations, THAT;-

5.1 Under solid waste;

- i. Despite the numerous campaigns on solid waste management, illegal dumping remains a major challenge faced by the sector;
- ii. Unsatisfactory state of repairs at Dandora dumpsite;
- iii. Delayed payments to contractors leading frequent withdrawal of trucks and heavy machinery;
- iv. Prolonged procurement procedures; and,
- v. On-going court case challenging franchising system of waste management.

5.2 Under recreation and greening services;

- i. The Sector performed dismally on revenue collections especially in the selling of seedlings;
- ii. Negative attitude in environmental conservation among the public.

5.3 Environmental Monitoring Compliance and Enforcement;

- i. Lack of sufficient transport;
- ii. Inadequate personnel to carry out patrols on a daily basis;
- iii. Inadequate deterrence in our courts;
- iv. Inadequate public awareness;
- v. Delayed procurement processes;
- vi. Court cases on public toilets management contracts; and,
- vii. Court cases on Solid Waste Management contracts.



6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

On the foregoing, the Committee recommends as following, THAT;-

6.1 On Solid Waste Management;

- i. The County Executive to ensure timely maintenance and repair of refuse trucks by ensuring there is and effective and operational maintenance unit;
- ii. The County Executive to forward Environmental policies and legislative proposals for consideration by the Assembly;
- iii. The County Executive to ensure procurement of equipment's and facilities for the sector's use is done in a timely manner; and
- iv. The Sector to ensure solid waste transportation contractors and other partners are paid in good time to avoid disruptions in normal operations.

6.2 On recreation and greening services;

- i. The Sector to consider upscaling the current nursery plant and decentralizing the same to sub-county level; and,
- ii. The sector to explore ways of embracing modern and cost effective irrigation techniques will minimize excess use and misuse of limited water supply.

6.3 On Environmental Monitoring Compliance and Enforcement;

- The sector to ensure full implementation of The NCC Public Nuisance Act,
 2021; and
- ii. The sector to engage and sensitize the general public on environmental responsibility.
