1.0. PREAMBLE

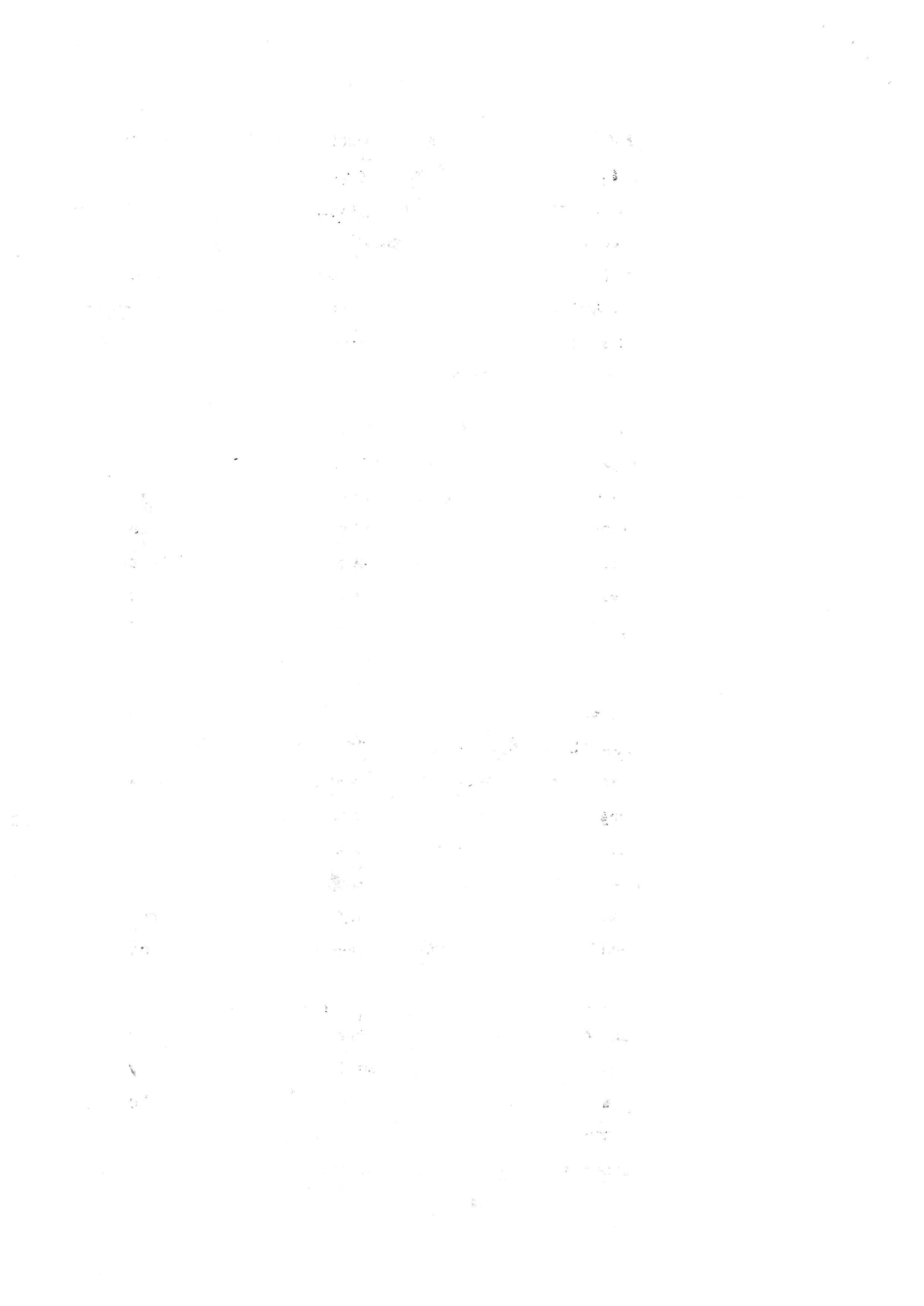
Mr. Speaker Sir, the third County Government in realization of the clarion call to deliver on its key promise of making Nairobi work moved swiftly to enact a legislation towards levying of charges to finance its core function and this resulted into the assenting of the Finance Act, 2023. The benefits that accrued to the County from this important piece of legislation was however short-lived following a landmark ruling on 19th June 2025 where Justice Bahati Mwamuye declared the Nairobi City County Finance Act, 2023 unconstitutional and against the provisions of Articles 196 and 201 of the Constitution of Kenya due to lack of proper public participation and violation of Section 120 of the County Governments Act as the county lacked a corresponding tariffs and pricing policy. The impact of the ruling was fast felt as it quashed new levies and fees requiring the County to revert to the 2022 fee structure until a valid Act is enacted.

Mr. Speaker Sir, the County in a quick rejoinder after extensive public participation formulated the Nairobi Tariffs and Pricing Policy 2025-2030 that has since been approved setting stage for enactment of a new Finance Bill. The policy has therefore addressed the gap in the court ruling by providing the basis for levying charges thereby avoiding arbitrary charges.

Mr. Speaker Sir, Article 209 of the Constitution empowers the counties to impose property rates, entertainment taxes as well as charges for the services that they offer. The County Government is alive to this key requirement submitted to the County Assembly the Nairobi City County Finance Bill, 2025 that seeks to amend various legislations related to various fees, rates and charges to enhance revenue collection and improve service delivery in line with aspirations of the current regime for the Financial Year 2025/26. The County Assembly as the watchdog has a key role in ensuring that the enacted Finance Acts strike a balance between raising revenues to fund key county functions, not making the electorates worse off, ensuring the County remains attractive as an investment hub, creates opportunities and has an enabling business environment. Further the County Assembly Finance, Budget and Appropriations Committee is mandated to ensure that the County's revenue raising measures are consistent with the national finance laws and do not hinder the economic activity of the Country in general.

Mr. Speaker Sir, the Select Committee on Finance, Budget and Appropriations Committee





Mr. Speaker Sir, since the inception of devolution the County has faced a myriad of challenges and chief of all has been the inability to meet the own source revenue targets in addition to the increasing demand for quality services given the status of the city as the capital of Kenya. In recognition of this, the National Government has recently entered into a cooperation agreement where it intends to pump substantive funds to ensure the city retains its status in the global sphere. To supplement this there must therefore be deliberate effort to bolster internal revenue collections for the services offered that are pegged on a Finance Act.

Mr. Speaker Sir, this being a delicate assignment must fully be undertaken within the legal realms to avoid the past litigations that resulted into nullification of both 2018 and 2023 Finance Acts by the courts thereby affecting the operations of the government. In scrutinizing this Bill, the Committee was alive to these past mistakes and addresses the mishaps adequately to ensure the final product not only have the public output but has adhered to all prevailing laws. In view of this the Committee has tabled a separate report capturing the views of the public arising from the public participation exercise conducted in the 17 sub counties as well as the stakeholders who submitted written memoranda.

Mr. Speaker Sir, this Bill aims to ensure financing the several programmes of the approved budget of Kshs.44.6billion for the FY 2025-26 and will ensure robust infrastructure across the county, improved medical facilities and attendant services, clean city devoid of garbage, high literacy levels through increased enrolment in Early Childhood Development Education and Technical and Voluntary Education Training, talent nurturing through superb facilities, increased trade through supporting of the SMEs and nurturing talent and skills. In as much as the County desires to achieve these aspirations the taxes and levies must meet the principles by ensuring equity, certainty, convenience and economy.

Mr. Speaker Sir, in the course of the deliberations on the Nairobi City County Finance Bill, 2023 the Committee held sittings with the officers from the County Treasury led by the County Executive Committee Member for Finance to explain to the Committee the reasoning behind the proposed changes. The Committee indeed received written submissions from key stakeholders and organized groups in addition to collecting public

hearings on the Bill across the Seventeen Sub-counties.

Mr. Speaker Sir, the Finance Bill 2025 having been read for the first time on 4th December 2025 was committed to the Committee for consideration and reporting. This is the second time the Select Committee is cross-examining and making recommendations on this critical piece of legislation that seeks to enhance revenue collection through various fees, rates and charges aimed to improve service delivery. The Committee has therefore considered the views of the public as well as the submissions from the County Executive Committee Member responsible for Finance and Economic Planning as contained in the amendments schedule.

Mr. Speaker Sir, I wish to thank the following for their commitment and valuable contributions:

- a) Members of the public who attended the public participation exercise on the Bill across the 17 No. Sub counties;
- b) Members of the public and organized groups who submitted their written memoranda on the Bill;
- c) The Members of the Finance, Budget and Appropriations Committee who worked tirelessly to ensure completeness in the examination of the Bill;
- d) Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the County Assembly for the continued support accorded to the Committee during consideration of the Bill;
- e) The sub County Finance officers and entire County Treasury team dispatched to aid in the deliberations of the Bill in various venues across the 17 No. Sub counties;
- f) The County Assembly Budget Office and its secretariat and County Assembly Legal Department for continued guidance to the Committee.

Mr. Speaker Sir, it's my humble duty on behalf of the Select Committee on County Finance, Budget and Appropriations to table this report on the examination of the Finance Bill, 2025 and recommend it to the Assembly for adoption.

2.0. EXAMINATION OF THE NAIROBI CITY COUNTY FINANCE BILL, 2025

2.1. SUMMARY OF THE BILL

Mr. Speaker Sir, the Committee after deep scrutiny noted the summary of the proposed amendments in the Finance Bill 2025 as follows: -

— Part II of the Bill intends to amend the Nairobi City County Revenue Act, 2015 with

- Markets services to expand categorization of markets, include all markets in the revenue net and amend charges for some existing markets. Introduce new charges for various market products in the markets and also fines for late payment of rent and display and sales of goods outside the stalls.
- Land rates by introducing new charges arising from the enactment of Nairobi City County Regularization of Unauthorized Developments Act ranging from grants, development control, transfers, charges and sublease as well as revision of annual land rates for county schemes and land survey fees .
- Public Health Services by introducing new charges for waste management and integrated pest control services and certification of PSVs with upto 10 passengers, tourist buses, school vans and school buses.
- Health Services by reviewing upwards the fees paid for food handlers certificate, reviewing fees for various County hospitals, introducing charges for ambulance services, family planning services, level 4 and 5 hospitals.

— Part III of the Bill proposes to amend specific provisions of the Nairobi City County Transport Act, 2020



















- Transport sector to amend as well as introduce charges related to off street parking tickets, violation charges/ fines specifically on towing and seasonal on street parking for public motorcycles(bodabodas) and motorcycle courier services within CBD.
- Transport sector also intends to introduce exemption permits for movement of abnormal/ oversize loads, overloading fines and vandalism of road furniture.
- Introduction of Road restoration levy on all vehicles transporting construction or related materials within Nairobi City County

- Part IV of the Bill proposes to amend the Nairobi City County Inspectorate Act, 2017 by introducing new charges for Dagoretii Training School, impounding charges and charges for misuse of county vehicles.
- Part V of the Bill entails proposal to amend the Outdoor Advertising and Signage Control and Regulation Act, 2018 to provide new definition of advertisement and introduce some new charges.
- Part VI proposes to amend the Nairobi City County Office of the County Attorney Act, 2017 by introducing some new charges.
- Part VII aims to amend Nairobi City County Cultural Heritage Act, 2017 by introducing some new charges.
- Part VIII of the Bill intends to amend the Nairobi County Disaster & Emergency Management Act, 2015 to vary the current charges and introduce some new charges.
- Part IX covers proposal to amend the Nairobi City County Trade Licensing Act, 2019 by deleting the clause “with exemptions of professionals’ and also varying and introducing new charges.
- Part X aims to revise the Nairobi City County Alcoholic Drinks Control and Licensing Act, 2014 revising charges and introducing new ones as well.
- Part XI by amending the Nairobi City Sports Management Act, 2017 by introducing and varying the charges.
- Part XII through amendment to the Nairobi City County Solid Waste Management Act, 2015 by varying and introducing some new charges.
- Part XIII provides for the amendment of the Nairobi City County Revenue Administration Act, 2021 to have the 5 members initially represented by umbrella bodies appointed by the CECM Finance provided they have minimum of a degree and knowledgeable in areas prescribed. The 2% of the annual estimated revenue for the operations is also proposed to be amended to be not less than 2% of the revenues in the financial statement for each financial year to be collected by the Board. The Act also intends to introduce a whistleblower reward.
